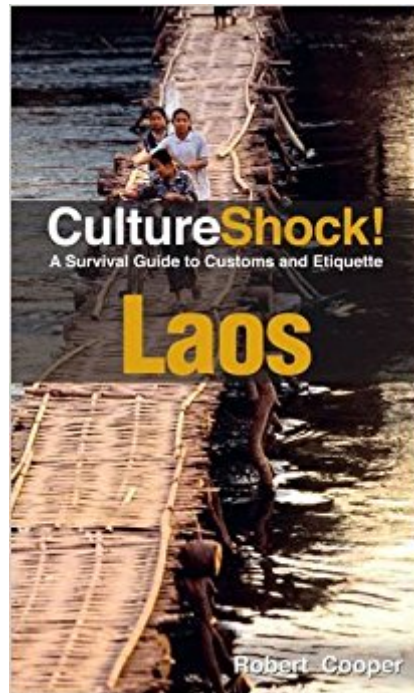




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Culture Shock! Laos: A Survival Guide To Customs And Etiquette
