


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Scared To Life: A Memoir

I have read quite a few travel memoirs in my time from Paul Theroux to more modern authors such as Peter Moore, etc, etc, etc. There is a huge market for these books and it seems an endless supply of authors trying to fill it. Jillian Webster's "Scared to Life" is up there with the best. I really enjoyed this book. It's well written and easy to read. Being an easy read doesn't take anything away from the book though, the book just seemed to flow. I would recommend this book to anyone who has travelled or plans to travel and wants some inspiration.

Three or four stars? It was a difficult choice. Jillian has written a memoir-cum-travel book which charts a rather painful ten years of her life. I was immediately drawn in by the introductory tale of her total rejection by her mother when she decided to leave the Jehovah's Witness religion. In retrospect I think all her angst-ridden confessions and her passion to "get away" stems from this cruel rejection. *Mea culpa* -- if you want to belong to an organised religion, be very wary of the Jehovah's Witnesses. It is an unforgiving religion. So Jillian pours out her anguish and despair at this loss of her mother's love, moves to Chicago, and becomes deeply conscious of her restlessness, unhappiness, and her wish to travel the world. Yet she is also really scared about doing such a thing, and she does goes on about it. But, brave girl, she becomes a backpacker. I really liked her travel tales; she writes well. What I did not like was that the first 30 pages which serve as introduction and the explanation of the Jehovah's rules, her decision to leave them, and her mother's reaction, were too drawn out. Also, she interspersed her travel chapters with angst-ridden, bad prose poems and pre-trip writings (same fears, phobias and retrospective thoughts, basically covering the same ground with every one) I started finding these chapters intrusive and rather irritating, and skimmed over them so she could continue her travel stories! She is a very honest writer, and does not gloss over the less enjoyable parts of her trip -- and there were truly horrible

times. But the trip is enriching, as all travels are. Yet, back in the States after about 6 months, the old dissatisfaction with her life is back -- surprisingly, I thought. But then again, the loss of mother love comes into play again. I tried to imagine myself in that position -- where your own mother refuses to be in a photo if Jillian is also in it -- and it's clear that this breach between mother and daughter has scarred Jillian for life. At the end of the book, when Jillian has fled the States once more, the question remains: will she ever find peace and satisfaction anywhere? All in all, I heartily recommend this "different" memoir to anyone who likes this genre.

I felt like I was dealing with Jillian's pain and excitement and all her emotions with her as I read.
